Public Policy Update

Status of the Infrastructure Bill, H.R. 3684:

Final passage of the multi-year, multi-billion-dollar infrastructure bill, H.R. 3684, the Infrastructure Investment & Jobs Act, continues to be stalled over congressional negotiations on the Budget Reconciliation bill. The House leadership plans to take up both bills together for debate and final passage and that is the reason final adoption of H.R. 3684 has been delayed. Although current highway and transit programs expired on September 30, Congress passed a temporary extension until December 3, allowing more time to reach a compromise on the Budget Reconciliation bill. The situation is fluid and changing by the minute. Be sure to keep reading your TSC email updates to stay informed.

There are several important truck safety improvements in H.R. 3684 that TSC has been working to advance for many years. These federal regulatory requirements, when implemented, have the potential to significantly reduce truck crashes, save lives and prevent injuries.

- Requires the U.S. Department of Transportation (DOT) to issue a regulation within two years mandating that automatic emergency braking (AEB) be required as standard equipment on all large new trucks.
- Requires the DOT to issue a regulation within one year to upgrade the existing weak rear underride guard standard to meet the stronger crash protocols recommended by the Insurance Institute for Highway Safety (IIHS).
- Establishes an advisory committee on underride protection.

TSC also was successful in stopping numerous special interest provisions to increase truck size and weights and rollback other federal truck safety rules from being inserted in the Senate bill, thanks to the work of our volunteers. Throughout the lengthy legislative process, volunteers contacted Members of Congress to oppose these anti-truck safety measures. However, the Senate bill does include provisions for DOT to establish a teen trucker pilot apprenticeship program as well as an Hours of Service (HOS) exemption for livestock haulers. TSC will continue to oppose these safety attacks.

Additionally, TSC will continue to push the Administration to implement other critical truck safety improvements such as mandating AEB on all new trucks, including delivery and box trucks, which were excluded from the infrastructure bill. TSC is also working to increase the current minimum insurance requirement for motor carriers, to mandate trucks be equipped with side and front underride guards and to strengthen federal driver training requirements to obtain a Commercial Driver's License (CDL).

Public Policy Update

Fiscal Year 2022 DOT Spending Bill

The Senate Appropriations Committee recently released several spending bills to fund government agencies, including the U.S. DOT in Fiscal Year 2022. The House-passed DOT spending bill does meet the Administration's request for an increase in funding for NHTSA but unfortunately, the Senate bill does not. TSC will be working to support additional funding for NHTSA since this agency is responsible for issuing safety standards for AEB in large trucks as well as a stronger rear underride requirement. Having adequate staff and financial resources will ensure that the rules are not delayed.

Relatedly, Rep. David Price (D-NC), Chairman of the House Appropriations Subcommittee with jurisdiction over DOT funding recently announced his plans to retire from Congress. TSC, particularly CRASH board member Jennifer Tierney, has worked closely with Chairman Price and his staff throughout his tenure to ensure adequate DOT funding for safety programs, advance truck safety measures and fight against anti-safety policy riders. We tweeted our appreciation for his longstanding safety leadership following his announcement.

Nominations of New Leaders for the Federal Motor Carrier Safety Administration (FMCSA) and the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) Move Forward

<u>Meera Joshi</u>, nominated to lead FMCSA, was approved by the Senate Committee on Commerce, Science and Transportation on October 20, 2021, by a vote of 22-6. The timing for her consideration by the full Senate has not been announced.


The nomination of <u>Dr. Stephen Cliff</u>, to lead NHTSA has been officially transmitted by the White House to the Senate. At this time, his nomination hearing before the Senate Committee on Commerce, Science and Transportation has not yet been scheduled.

Upcoming Meeting of the Federal Motor Carrier Safety Advisory Committee (MCSAC)

On December 6 and 7, the MCSAC will hold a meeting. We are honored to have three volunteers serving as members. They are Dawn King, president of TSC, Jane Mathis, board member of P.A.T.T. and Tami Friedrich Trakh, board member of CRASH.

New Crash Fatality Data

On October 28, NHTSA <u>released new estimates</u> for the first six months of 2021 showing a nearly 20 percent increase in crash fatalities over the same period in 2020. This represents the largest six-month increase recorded in the history of NHTSA's Fatality Analysis Reporting System (FARS). We do not yet have any estimates for truck crash fatalities but expect, based on this preliminary data, that there will be an increase adding more urgency to pushing our safety agenda during the Sorrow to Strength conference when meeting with Members of Congress.

Next Zoom: Preparing for the Holidays



VOLUNTEER PROFILE: EILEEN WOELKERS MILLER







Eileen Wolkers Miller lost her son, Paul, to a truck crash on July 5th, 2010. Paul was driving home on Rte. 33 in Hamilton, Township, PA when a southbound tractor-trailer crossed the center grass divider and traveled head-on into Paul's car and a northbound van. Paul died from injuries suffered in the truck crash. The truck driver was distracted at the time of the crash. Paul was 21 years old. Since then, Eileen has fought for justice in honor of her son Paul. Eileen has become an outspoken truck safety advocate at the local and state level. Her family has established The Paul J. Miller, Jr. Memorial Scholarship for a deserving sophomore at Lackawanna College. Eileen has been working at the Pennsylvania capital to push for her son's bill, HB37, which will be Paul Miller's Law, also known as the Driver Enhanced Responsibility Legislation, which prohibits drivers from touching or supporting their phone with their body while they are driving.
